Last Rites Said For Anna Timm

Funeral services were held Saturday, Jan. 10, at St. Paul's Lutheran Church in Tama for Anna Timm, 76, of 511 E. 5th St., Tama, who died at Sunny Hill Rest Home Jan. 7. She had been in the home since Jan. 30, 1969 because of ill health.

The Rev. Hansen officiated at the services. Burial was in Maple Grove Cemetery in Columbia Township.

The daughter of Henry and Augusta Fredrichs Graff, Mrs. Timm was born July 9, 1893 in Sheridan Township of Poweshiek County. She was the oldest in a family of ten children. As a child she lived on a farm in Poweshiek County and attended the rural schools near her home.

On March 20, 1912 she was married to Gustav Timm at her parents home. After their marriage they lived on what is now known as the John Hink farm for one year. In 1913 they purchased the home farm in Columbia Township from Mr. Timm's father. They lived in this home until 1942 when they moved to 511 East 5th St. in Tama. Mr. and Mrs. Timm had celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary in 1962.

During her years on the farm, Mrs. Timm attended St. John's Lutheran church in rural Tama and was a member of the Ladies Aid and held various other offices. After retiring to Tama, she transferred to St. Paul's Lutheran Church. She was a member of the Dorcas Circle at the time of her death and was a 50-year member of the Maple Grove Cemetery Association.

Survivors include one daughter, Mrs. Donald (Bernice) Baustian of rural Malcom; one son, Alfred Timm of rural Tama; ten grandchildren; 17 great-grandchildren; four sisters—Mrs. Eda Jochims of Tama, Mrs. Nellie Oltrogge of Montezuma, Mrs. Herman (Marie) Beck and Mrs. Lester (Emma) Luttman of Grinnell; and three brothers — Henry and Herman Graff of Tama and Rudolph Graff of Montezuma.

Mrs. Timm was preceded in death by her husband and a son, Herman, in 1963; her parents; two grandchildren, one brother and one sister. 1-2-1970 H-R
