The death of Mrs. O. J. Turner, which occurred at Ft. Dodge Thursday, has brought to a close a beautiful and useful life of a woman beloved by all who know her. Funeral services were conducted Sunday afternoon at 1:30 o'clock by Elder R. L. Keeton from the Victor Grange Hall, formerly the Primitive Baptist church of which Mrs. Turner had been a member since early girlhood.
