SPANISH WAR @-# VETERAN DEAD

James W. Vaughn Passes in Government Hospital at Fort Sam Houston, Texas.

FUNERAL SERVICES ON WEDNESDAY, AT 1:30 P. M.

From Snyder Brothers Chapel_Interment Will be in Kellogg Cemetery.

James W. Vaughn, veteran of the Spanish-American War, formerly of Kellogg and Grinnell, passed away last Friday, Feb. 12, in the government hospital at Fort Sam Houston, Texas, where he had been a patient for about two weeks. His health had been failing for several years. His body was brought back to Grinnell Monday night and funeral services will be held at 1:30 o'clock Wednesday afternoon from the Snyder Brothers Chapel conducted by Rev. Robert Lincoln. Burial will be in the Kellogg cemetery.

Mr. Vaughn is well remembered in this locality. He was born March 15, 1874, and grew to manhood in Kellogg. Later he lived in Grinnell for a time and then moved to Des Moines. He had made his home in Texas for several years, most of the time at San Antonio. He is survived by his wife, two sisters, Mrs. A. W. Howell of the Westfield neighborhood and Mrs. Phil Dean of this city and two brothers, Frank of Madison, Wis., and Bert of Los Angeles. Mrs. Vaughn accompanied her husband's body to Grinnell and is a guest at the Howell and Dean homes. Mrs. Vaughn before her marriage on May 18, 1901, was Miss Bessie Bartlett, of Newton.

At the opening of the Spanish-American War Mr. Vaughn enlisted in Co. L. 50th Iowa Regiment, from Newton, and saw service with that organization. At the time of his death he was aged 51 years, 10 months and 25 days.
