Mrs. Warburton Passes Away

ved Resident of Grinnell for Thirty Years Passes Away Wednesday Evening Beloved

FUNERAL SERVICES ARE HELD HERE THIS MORNING

Body is Taken to Independence, Old Family Home, for Burial Beside Her Husband

Mrs. D. R. Warburton, for thirty years one of the good wives and mothers of Grinnell, passed away Wednesday evening after an illness of three weeks. She was seventy-five years old last August.

Funeral services were held this morning from the Warburton home on Park street, now occupied by Professor and Mrs. J. M. Bridgham, conducted by Rev. N. W. Wehrhan. Mrs. E. B. T. Spencer brought an appreciated tribute in song Pall bearance. ciated tribute in song. Pall bearers were Professor Bridgham, J. G. Shifflett, N. M. Harris, C. A. Blair, C. S. George and Professor R. H. Perring.

Mrs. Warburton had lived a blame-less life of usefulness and service in

Grinnell. She was born August 12, 1855, in Rockford, Ill., the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William Boyack, who had come from Scotland only a year before. When she was a year old her parents moved to the farm near Independence which was their home-stead for many years and which still remains in the family. Here she grew to young womanhood, attending school and being for a time a stud-ent in Upper Iowa University at Fayette.

While she was growing up on the farm, a young man, D. R. Warburton, was living on a farm only a few miles away and in 1880 they were married. For a time they lived on the farm and then moved to Jewell, where Mr. Warburton conducted a general store and during that time there was in his employ a young man named Clarence George, now better known to Grinnell people as C. S. George, with whom Mrs. Warburton has always maintained a close friend-

Thirty years ago, Mr and Mrs. Warburton moved to Grinnell in order to give their children the advan-tages of a college education. They built the beautiful home on Park street and lived happily there until the death of Mr. Warburton in 1924 interrupted their perfect companion-ship. Since then Mrs Warburton has lived quietly in Grinnell, keeping rooms for herself in her home and active and interested in her clubs, ther church and many projects for the good of others. She was a woman widely known and widely loved and respected and the news of her death has been a sad blow to many friends.

She is survived by two brothers, William Boyack of Independence and Breeze Boyack of Afton, two daughters, Mrs. Ralph West of Omaha and Mrs. Francis Smith of Lander, Wyoming, and one grand daughter, Mir-iam Smith. Her daughters and their husbands were with her when the end came and remained for the funeral today. Breeze Boyack of Afton, Howard Smith of Jewell and Mrs. H. M. Harris of Des Moines came from out of town to attend the funeral but most of the relatives met the funeral

party at Independence.

Mrs. Warburton, during all the period of her residence here, was a valued member of the Priscilla Club. Sh was also an interested member of the Historical and Literary Club and was active in the Congregational church.

She was the last resident member of a family which has always stood for good things in this community and she will long be remembered for the good which she accomplished

during her long life here.
