She was born in Lewisburg, Pennsylvania, August 25, 1902, the daughter of Thomas Frank-lin Hamblin, and Lillian Hall Hamblin, and aftended the pub-lic schools and Bucknell Uni-versity at Lewisburg, receiving the Bachelor of Arts degree in 1924, and then a Master of Arts at Chicago University in 1925. After a year of teaching in Jun-ior High School of Shippens-burg, Pennsylvania, she was

united in marriage with Reverend Roland M. Wendell, then the pastor of the Conesus, N. Y. Community church. To this union were born ion were born two sons, Richard Hamblin and David Livingston, both of Golden, Colorado.

Assisting her husband in pastoral labors in the Conesus and also churches in Williamsville, N. Y., Elmira, N. Y., and Rochester, N. Y., she completed her theological training in 1934, graduating from the Colgate Rochester Divinity School with a Bachelor of Divinity degree, and was ordained into the ministry that year. Since then she has co-pastored with Mr. Wendell in ministries at Sidney, N. Y., and Salamanca, N. Y., occupying the pulpit at regular intervals until 1945, when her husband became Rural Life Director of the New York Congre-, gational Conference, and, her sons away in higher schools, she began regular preaching at one or more churches weekly until the time of her death.

After co-pastorates in Cortland. Ogdensburg and Freehold, N. Y., the Wendells came to Iowa and served jointly larger parishes, first from 1953 to 1958 at Cromwell, Iowa together with Fairview, Corning and Oak Hill. Gravity, all Congregational churches, then from 1958 to 1960 at the Stuart, Iowa Congregational and Fairview Congregational Christian church, and since 1960 at the Newburg, Iowa, and Chester Center Congregational churches, which she was co-pastoring at the time of her death.

In addition to parsonage home making and her pastoral duties. She is survived by her husband, Rev. Roland M. Wendell her sons, a brother and sister Dr. Russell Hamblin and Miss Clarissa Hamblin, both of Wat l sontown, Pennsylvania.
