Long and husband and son Tracy, his sister Miss June Westbrook of Chicago and brother Louis Westbrook of Pittsburg. The interment was in Hazelwood cemetery beside the grave of his father. The services were conducted by the Rev, E. M. Vittum assisted by Prof. L. F. Parker and a quartette consisting of Dr. O. F. Parish, F. R. Morrison, W. C. Staat and A. C. Harriman.
