Sarah Elma Ratcliff, daughter of

and 7 days.

They were conducted by Rev. Robert Lincoln and wife, assisted by Rev. L. A. Hawkes. The casket was covered with beautiful flowers, tokens of the general esteem in which she was held. The remains were laid to rest in the reach cemetery, to await the resuryorn.
