Mrs. Rachel Pollock Work passed away Sunday afternoon at 2:30 after a trying illness of several months. Deceased was born in Indiana County, Penn., in 1872 and was a member of a family of seven children. She attended the Pennsylvania State Normal School, at Indiana, Penn., and after finishing her studies for eight years devoted her time to teaching, two of which were in a Mission School, connected with the Reformed Presbyterian church, of which she was a member, at Selma, Ala. There it was she first lost her health, contracting a malarial disease in the warm and humid southern atmosphere. Up to that time she had always been the picture of healthy buoyancy and abundant spirits.
