He pioneered many early experimental crops for Iowa State College, some of which were hybrid seed corn, crown vetch, birdfoots trefoil and prairie grasses. He provided areas and planted trees for pheasants, partridge and other wildlife. Lauren received numerous awards and recognition for his pioneering in farming and conservation practices. He served many years at the county and township levels with the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Commission and the Soil Conservation Service.

He was preceded in death by his wife, Ruth Peterson Wright; his parents and step-father, Joseph Wright, Elsie Wright Benton and Robert Benton; and a brother Joseph Wright.
