

# Leslie Young 6-4 Dies Sunday 2-28-1928

Prominent Rock Creek Farmer Succumbs to Long and Painful Illness.

BURIAL IS MADE IN  
HAZELWOOD CEMETERY.

Funeral Services Conducted This Afternoon At Home by Rev. H. C. Rice.

Many friends have been saddened by the death of Leslie B. Young, prominent farmer in Rock Creek township, which occurred Sunday morning at 10:40 o'clock at the home five miles west of town. Mr. Young had been in ill health for many months, and death came to him as a welcome relief from intense suffering. He was born and grew to manhood in Rock Creek township, where he has been active in all community affairs and has held a place of high respect among his fellow men.

Funeral services were conducted at 1:30 o'clock this afternoon from the home by Rev. H. C. Rice. Music was furnished by Mrs. J. S. McCunniff and Mrs. Roscoe Dempster, who sang, "Face to Face," "Ivory Palaces" and "Far Away." Bearers were: Roy Powers, Clan Powers, C. O. Adkins, John Ahrens, Jr., Fred Phipps of Marshalltown, and Floyd Elmore of Montezuma. Burial was in Hazelwood.

Leslie Burton Young, the son of Mr. and Mrs. A. B. Young, was born in Rock Creek township, Jasper County, March 7, 1878, and passed away February 26, 1928, at his home five miles west of Grinnell, being at the time of his death 49 years, 11 months, and 20 days old. On December 28, 1904, he was united in marriage to Katie C. Ahrens. This union was blessed with twin daughters, Helen and Hilda. About a year ago his health began to fail. On December 12, 1927, he underwent an operation from which he never fully regained his health. He realized toward the last that there was no hope for his recovery, yet he bore his suffering cheerfully and patiently to the end, always quietly appreciative of the kindly care administered by his loved ones, and looked with utmost faith to his Savior for relief. He was a helpful husband, a kind and loving father, always ready to lend a helping hand in time of need.

Mr. Young was a farmer of the best type. He made a success of farming because he was careful and conservative and looked after his business affairs with care. He was active in social life in his community and gave willingly of his time and strength to promote community welfare.

He leaves to mourn his loss a faithful wife, twin daughters, Helen and Hilda, his mother, Mrs. Emily Young, one sister, Mrs. J. R. Powers of Kellogg, a brother, V. L. Young, and a host of friends and relatives.
